County Fruit Inspector.

Having been appointed fruit inspector for Polk county, one of my duties will be to inspect fruit trees and orchards to see if they are free from disease. Another duty will be to see the horticultural law about spraying codling moth and other tree infections is complied with, also to guard against the selling of wormy or diseased apples pears or other fruit. The best and cheapest spray for the codling moth is arsenate of lead which can be had at either Dallas drug store at 20 cents a pound and two pounds will make 50 gallons of spraying material which will not burn the leaves. To prepare it put the lead in two gallons of water and after stirring it until dissolved pour the mixture into a 50 gallon tank. President Smith of the state horticultural society says it is 50 per cent cheaper than any other spray as it will stay on longer, rain not washing it off like the other spraying compounds. For scab on apples and pears, when trees are in foliage use the bordeaux mixture. In one vessel dissolve 3 pounds of blue vitriol in water and in another 6 pounds of lime, being poured together they will make 50 gallons of spraying material which may be combined with the lead spray. Plummers Hops.

H. B. Plummer is running the 12 acre Uglow yard and thinks it among the best in the state. He accounts for the superior quality by extra good cultivation all of it having been plowed 18 inches deep. He expects an output of a ton to the acre, the average yard not going much over half that. Two weeks ago his yard was thick with lice and honey dew but now there is no sign of either. He sprayed with whale-oil soap and quassa, the former 80 percent strength. The vines being well saturated the solution was taken up by them and circulated to the extremities of the plant, killing the lice that were not touched by the spray. He says that some growers who used weaker soap have had to spray a second time with a stronger article.
