**Secrets of the Eyebrows.**  
The eyebrows are very significant of character and emotion. Their beauty consists in having them moderately thick, especially near the inner third and tapering to a point—soft, silky, regular hairs, a shade darker than the hair of the head, slightly curved, separated on the bridge of the nose and clearly defined against the skin.

When the eyebrows are irregular and bristly the offending hairs may be maintained in their proper place by adhesive pomade or removed entirely if they are superfluous. It is not well to trim the eyebrows generally, as it makes it coarse, and in using tweezers great care must be taken not to pull out hairs which ought to remain.
