Lumbering Prospects.

Several enterprising men who have large timber holdings at the head of Mill Creek have been here this week investigating the feasibility of running a railroad from the timber to Dallas and building another large sawmill here. They say the more mills located close together the better it is for all concerned, as large lumber buyers always go first to such places, because they are there more apt to get their orders filled. The mills here and at Falls City place but little stress on local demand, the bulk of their output being shipped away. Though double as much lumber is shipped from here as formerly, the mill men now find it easier to get cars than when Dallas was a less important shipping point.

Something About Hops.

Trust corporations and combinations seem to have control of the Oregon hop market. Choice hops are worth 22 cents in New York and our state has as good as the world produces, yet they are selling here at 10 cents and it costs only 3 cents to take them east, leaving a whole of a profit for the buyer. For several years most buyers have lost heavily and have combined to retrieve their fortunes at the expense of growers. It is evident that most of this seasons crop has been sold far below its real value. Shrewd combinations of buyers and a lack of unity among growers account for the situation.
