planting can be secured even in the New England states. There is this to be said in favor of home grown plants as compared with plants shipped from a distance—that even in favorable seasons a better stand of plants is always secured from the use of home grown stock when lifted and immediately reset, while in trying seasons the difference is very considerable, even amounting to as much as success or failure in the stand. Then, too, home grown plants can be lifted with a ball of earth by means of a transplanting device and reset without a shock during extremely adverse weather conditions.



Plants with small crowns—i. e., a moderate growth of leaves—and with an abundant development of fibrous roots, as in the first cut, are the most desirable. If the leaf area seems to be too great for the root system of the plant the removal of two or three of the older leaves will prove an advantage, as this will reduce the surface of evaporation (transpiration) and will

lessen the demand upon the roots, which, because of having been disturbed, are not in a position to perform their normal functions in full measure. During a drought this is more important than during periods of frequent showers. If the crown and the roots of the plant are in good condition the success of the plantation is assured provided the ground has been well prepared and the work of planting is done with care.

New Texas Penches. A new pench exhibited before the recent meeting of fruit and truck growers at Tyler, Tex., is the Guilan. One advantage claimed for the Guilan is that it ripens ten or twelve days earlier than the Elberta. It has some of the characteristics of the Crawford. The Guilan is a yellow pench, with the surface almost entirely covered with red; quality is better than Elberta; a perfect freestone, with rather large pit. The pench is very firm and has made a splendid record as a shipper. Roland Morrill is said to have planted 100 acres of this variety last spring.

Many Swine. Swine, the most numerous of all domestic animals in the Philippine Islands, as shown in the census reports of those islands, are found in every province and island of the archipelago.

Veterinary Hints. Lambs affected with gorter indicate lack of complete nutrition, doubtless due to the lack of a sufficient grain ration to pregnant ewes. In and in breeding ewes to cause a weakness of this sort, and in all cases where the disease is prevalent a change of blood (ram) should be made. Presence of lime in drinking water is the cause in some instances. Treat by generous feeding of nursing ewes. Remove wool and comb in lambing ewes on enlargement. In very bad cases scarification and bleeding of the tumors is the most effective treatment.—Breeder's Gazette.

Treatment For Ringbone. Lameness due to ringbone on hind pastern may be removed by repeated application of blister, says Breeder's Gazette. Puncture firing and blistering is more certainly effective. Severe measures must be adopted in such cases.

Stringhalt. It would be due to some affection of the back joint or foot, in which case the removal of the cause will remove the effect. When no such cause is manifest a competent veterinarian may sometimes relieve the ailment, to some extent at least, by cutting the lateral extensor of the foot. It is usually considered an incurable fault.—Atlanta Constitution.

To eradicate Hog Lice. For lice on hogs use equal parts of kerosene oil and buttermilk thoroughly mixed together or one quart of kerosene, one quart of soft soap and one quart of grease or fat boiled with a gallon of soft water so as to make a thick mix. Sprinkle lightly on the hogs two or three times ten days apart. A good plan is to sprinkle nests and sleeping places also.—Rural New Yorker.

To relieve Heaves. To relieve heaves, give the horse a tablespoonful of Fowler's solution of arsenic three times daily in the food. Give less hay or grass and keep the horse from eating the straw bedding. Avoid anything which will distend the stomach, and give more grain instead.—Hoard's Dairyman.

Mange in Dogs. Mange is a parasitic disease, says Hoard's Dairyman. If it is a long haired animal, have him clipped as close as possible and soften the scabs, then apply this ointment: Sublimed sulphur, one ounce; oil of juniper, three ounces; lard, five ounces. Mix and apply. After having left on forty-eight hours wash off and repeat. Give two drops of solution of arsenic twice daily.

Marketing a Horse. When fitting a horse for the market bear in mind the fact that 100 pounds of fat on the animal will often add \$100 to his selling value and sometimes more than that.

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How to Set a Duck.

Some people set duck eggs on the solid ground without anything at the bottom of the nest, but this is wrong. Should there be nothing but the earth at the bottom of the nest when the eggs chip the back of the duckling comes through the shell on to the hard ground. Out of eleven eggs there may be two or three turned so that the back is on the ground, and when this is the case the youngsters are frequently suffocated. When there is some hay or something loose or porous at the bottom of the nest they are able to breathe and thus do not get suffocated. It is possible to set the eggs on the bare ground and every egg to hatch out without losing a single duckling, and it has been done, but there is a possibility of their getting suffocated, so it is far better to have the nest properly made.

Poultry Growing.

The reasonable application of good common sense is the most certain way to succeed with all branches of poultry growing. Too much coddling and fancy ways are not best for success. Manage them like chickens and as chickens should be handled, and all will go well with them. If handled like hothouse plants, less success will be attained. Keep poultry as it should be kept, not along the fancy lines that are followed with delicate house pets.—Country Gentleman.

The Morning Feed.

Fowls which are overfed in the morning are sluggish all day and become lazy and go out of condition. It is exercise of muscle that creates proper functional tone. All birds are active by nature, if productiveness is expected natural laws must be observed. Feed moderately in the morning, especially when the flock is small and kept in limited range.

A Good Roost.

A good roost has strong wires suspended from the ceiling. Through loops in their bottom ends are run two bars grooved to receive other bars crosswise. This is easily taken apart and not so accessible to mice.

Dry breadcrumbs mixed with one-fourth their weight of raw egg, then dried till not sticky, is a fine food for young chicks or poults.
