Best Pruning Time.

In response to many inquiries as to the best time for pruning I would say that the best time for pruning is between the first of December and the last of March. Most farmers have more spare time during these months than later in the season. Trees pruned in May or June will heal over sooner than those pruned earlier, but to get the best results from spraying I would advise winter pruning. For canker or dead spot apple and pear scale trees should be sprayed in February or March. J. B. Nunn, county fruit inspector.
