Best Pruning Time.
In response to many inquiries as to the best time for pruning I would say any time between the first of December and the last of March. Most farmers have more spare time during those months than later in the spring. Trees pruned in May or June will heal over sooner than those pruned earlier, but to get the best results from spraying I would advise winter pruning. For canker or dead spot, apple and pear scale trees should be sprayed in February or March. J. B. Nunn, county fruit inspector.

In Eastern Oregon turkeys are herded on the range the same as sheep. One man thus raised 500 and drove them many miles to a railroad station for shipment to Portland.
