NEWBERG NOT IN IT.

Dallas Ships by Far More Cars of
Freight Each Month.

The appended table of number of freight cars shipped out of the main shipping points of the valley is clipped from the Newberg Graphic. The editor of that paper got his information from the railroad agent at that place, and the agent from the monthly report of the Pacific Northwest Car

association. This report is not correct, authentic, or in any manner a fair showing of the business done. Take Dallas for instance: That report says we shipped 137 cars in July and Newberg 166. Newberg may have actually shipped out that many, but we rather doubt it, as there is only one saw-mill located there, and it only a 12-hour mill. Dallas has three large mills, and several up in the mountains, who virtually ship from here. During July over 100 cars of freight were sent out from Falls City and intermediate points and billed here for the east, but were not counted in this report. In fact we only report and count what is loaded here. According to Newberg's way of counting we could brag of several hundred cars for July, but will only now claim:
