Orders have been placed by the Salem, Falls City & Western Railroad, operating a line from Dallas to Falls City, for 24 flat cars. Each will be of 70,000 pounds capacity, and have a length of 41 feet. The contract was closed this week, but deliveries will not be made until October and November. Included in the order is a 45-ton mogul locomotive. The company already has 23 flats in service, and the additional rolling stock will double the equipment of the line. Surveys have been completed from Falls City to Salem. The company has secured right of way for its needs about Eola bluff, where logs hauled from the interior will be dumped into the Willamette and then rafted. The terminals will be at West Salem, but no connection will be made with other lines. The extension is 15 miles long. The line was originally incorporated to build 30 miles into the Siletz country, and this may be done during the next few years.—Telegram.
