The men and interests making up the opposition to William R. Hearst in New York afford ample reason why every local democrat should give him enthusiastic support. The men who "preserved the national honor" in 1906, the insurance grafters, the advocates of special interests, the corporation managers, the Wall street financiers and the bond brokers who trafficked in the government's need—all these are matched solidly against Mr. Hearst, and their opposition should solidify the people in support of the man who is making such an open and telling fight against these harmful interests. Mr. Hearst is making a magnificent campaign and is frankly telling the people just where he stands.

"Keep it out of the papers" is the cry the local newspaper man hears constantly. To oblige the askers often costs considerable, though the party making the request thinks the granting scarcely worth saying "thank you" for. A newspaper is a peculiar thing in the public's eye. The news gatherer is stormed at because he gets one item and doesn't get another. Young men and often young women as well as older persons perform acts which become legitimate items for publication, and then rush to the newspaper office to have it suppressed. The next day they condemn the same paper for not having published the same thing they were guilty of forgetting apparently, at their last visit to the printing office. The subscribers expect to read the news and there is always wonder when, for sweet charity's sake, an item on the street, in everybody's mouth, is not found in the next issue of the paper.

As mentioned in last week's Itemizer, the Sheridan train now leaves there at 7 o'clock in the morning, doing away with the early start that has made it such a hardship to people of that vicinity. It leaves Portland now at 4:10 in the evening. Why is it that it could not leave Portland a few minutes earlier and connect with the Dallas train at St. Joe is a problem that the traveling public cannot understand. With numerous trains up and down the west side of the river running nearly parallel with each other and never more than fifteen miles apart, it is a wonder to all why they cannot make connection and give passengers a chance to get over on one line to the other. This is done in the morning at St. Joe, and up passengers can make the transfer all right without waiting, but in the afternoon and evening it cannot be done. Those, say from Forest Grove or Hillsboro, have either to go to Portland or McMinnville to make the change, and lose some nights. If the Southern Pacific could make up their minds to give us a little better time between both ends of the lines and the metropolises and connect at some central point, it would be a service greatly to be appreciated by those who have to patronize them. The changes being made have bettered things materially, but it could yet be far more convenient.

Since the above was in type, we have had a conference with Mr. J. P. Jones. He thinks the suggestions feasible, and will recommend them to the operating department. He assures me that his company desires to and will work for the best convenience of its patrons, and that any suggestions along such lines will be gladly received and acted upon when possible.
