CITY COUNCIL.

New Marshal Elected and One Water Bond Taken Up.

The council met in regular session last Monday evening with all the aldermen and city officers present except Auditor Stouffer, Alderman Ayres assuming his duties.

O. A. Condit offered to turn a \$1,000 water bond at \$12.50 premium, and the offer was accepted and the bond ordered taken up.

W. J. White resigned as city marshal, and his resignation was accepted.

The Vassall sidewalk business was laid over to inquire into a suggestion by Mr. Vassall regarding the extension of said walk.

All other sidewalk improvements were again postponed.

An electric light ordinance was passed giving to the Willamette Valley Co. the same rights as of the old company until the termination of the franchise some three years hence. A change in the are system was also included, in which the city now gets 22 lights at a rate of \$6 each, instead of 16 lights at \$7.25.

Chas. Palmer and Mr. Palmer got two votes and Mr. Palmer five.

J. M. Sears was cited to appear and show cause why certain sidewalk improvements had not been made.

The city attorney was ordered to bring in an ordinance repealing what is known as the Meat ordinance, and which prohibits the peddling of fresh meat within the city limits in less quantities than one quarter.

The marshal was instructed to see that the curfew ordinance is enforced.
