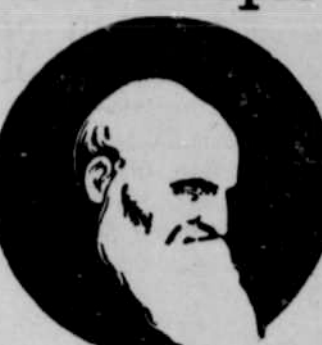

We wish our correspondents would try and send in weekly letters, especially during this dull sales period.

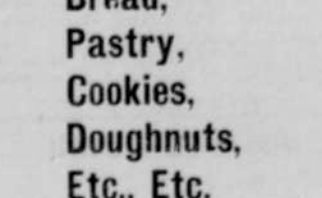
Town people greatly miss the mail box on the river, so long kept up by the courtesy of our genial postmaster.
