THE MOHAIR INDUSTRY.

Paper Read By W. A. Ayres at
The Goat Show Meeting.

Shearing:
Have the goats clean and dry. Do not shear them when wet for the mohair will mold if baled soon. Shear with a machine, if possible, as sheep make too many second cuts. Careless shears in this operation is responsible for much of the best part of the fleece being cut into short lengths. These short lengths have very little value as they are disposed of as waste, and entail much expense in sorting, which the producer has to pay. Shear in a clean place. Do not shear where there is any hay, straw, or any dirt of any kind that would get in the mohair. Too much stress cannot be laid on these two things, clean goats and a clean place to shear them.

Cleaning:
Shearing off all dung, locks, tags, mud balls, and any stained or badly discolored hair. Shear the belly, if bad, the inside of the legs and the stained breech. If the back is stained, run a brush with the clippers or shears up the back from the tail to the horns. Put this in the tag, sack or sixth grade. Don't mix this with the rest of the fleece, as all this must be sorted out, and the producer can do it cheaper than consumer, and will raise the standard of the clip. Do this when you first begin to shear. Don't wait until the fleece is off the goat, as no one can see the stained or discolored mohair as well off the goat as on. In sorting after fleece was off, our loss was from 5 to 10 per cent of stained mohair, as against one per cent when sorted, when sorting. Don't get hay or straw in the mohair, but if you don't put it with the clean hair. Put it in a separate bag. Straws, hay, straw, mud balls, short and stained hair, in the bulk of the Oregon mohair has to be reckoned on when bought by the manufacturer. Stained mohair can only be used for black goods, and

therefore brings a much less price than possible hair.

Grading:
Fleeces with length of staple over six inches can be classed as combing. After cleaning, lay fleeces out, put up any loose pieces on top and roll up tight, and pack to grade it below as follows: No. 1 should contain strictly fine haired fleeces; No. 2 medium haired fleeces; No. 3 strong coarse haired fleeces; No. 4 mohair less than six inches long should be classed as short staple; No. 5, colored fleeces either fine, coarse or short must be put up separate and classed as gray mohair; No. 6, dung locks, tags, discolored burry, etc. is put in this class. Mohair fleeces should never be tied, as offed pieces of string will be missed by the sorters, and will continue through the several processes, and not be noticed until the goods are dyed and finished, when it shows up in small patches, not having taken the dye as strings are mostly vegetable matter, and do not color with the same dye as mohair, which is animal matter.

Baling:
It is the seller's advantage to make the best possible first impression on the buyer, and that is one of the results of correct baling. Some bales reach the factory in good condition and are nicely packed, while others contain much hay, straw, dung, and other litter. Here is where the grower who takes some pains to put out his clip in good condition and sells with the pool is a loser, by having his mohair baled with the clips that are more poor in condition and quality. Some bales of Oregon mohair cost as high as four cents per pound to sort it, while others count less than two cents. Whenever possible, have your mohair baled not less than 19 pounds to the cubic foot, as the freight rate is about one-half as much as when sent in bags. The most convenient bale to handle and which arrives at the factory in good order, weighs from 300 to 350 pounds. This makes a bale three feet long, two feet wide and 27 to 28 inches deep. If you use burlap as a covering, make one the same size out of muslin, to go between the burlap and mohair, as the lint on burlap puts vegetable matter in the hair. Put a No. 12 or baling wire, about every four or five inches around the outside of the bale, after it is sewn up, as the thread will not hold it. This makes the tare weight about 300 pounds of stock, and is quite a saving in stock.
