### One of Polk's Big Farms.

The field editor of the Pacific Homestead at Salem has this to say of Mr. J. B. Stump, one of our most up-to-date breeders and farmers: Mr. Stump is a native Oregonian and one of our most progressive farmers, with whom the readers of the Homestead are more or less familiar. He is one of the foremost breeders of Angora goats and Lincoln and Cotswold sheep, and has lately acquired a small herd of excellent Jersey cattle. Mr. Stump has a large farm, some 500 acres—too much for one man to handle profitably under the present conditions of farm help. Fifty acres of his farm are planted to English walnuts and he intends to plant twenty-five acres more to walnuts and cherries in alternate rows, the cherries to serve as a filler until the walnuts produce a good growth and then the cherries will be taken out.

### Long Distance Flame Project.

They claim that such a roadway can easily be built and will prove a great money saver to those using it.
