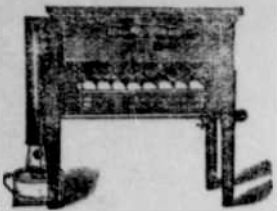

On last Friday afternoon, probably 75 enthusiastic Dallas rooters accompanied our exultant basketball team to the capital city, to aid them in walking away with the Willamette University five and incidentally securing sufficient percentage as to enable them to clinch the pennant for this year's collegiate games. That they did so is now a matter of history and our boys are now IT, although they have yet two more games to play—Multnomah and Newberg, the former here and the latter at their own home. Even if they should lose these games—hardly to be thought of—their percentage would yet be sufficient to keep them at the head of the list. It was not yet editor's pleasure to be present, from the fact that he would have to walk to get there, as every rig in town was engaged and several were sent for from Monmouth and Independence to take over some of our fans who just naturally had to see that our five did their work up in shape. An account of this game would for this same reason have to be second hand, and probably not very intelligent. It is claimed by those who saw the game that it was a most interesting and close one, though hardly in doubt from the start, after the first basket was thrown. Our boys outplayed and outgeneraled them all the way through. The Salem correspondent to the Oregonian claimed that their big center outplayed our Ned Shaw. That fellow wants to put on his glasses for the next game he reports, as anyone with half an eye could see that our center always put the ball just where he wanted it, and was not slow about it either. Craven made the most baskets for us, scoring 12 points. The other boys all did just what was expected of them at just the right time, and if Referee Thorpe, of Monmouth, had been just a little more unbiased in his rulings, our score would have been considerably larger. 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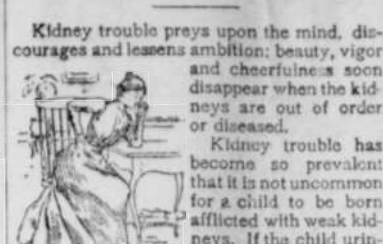

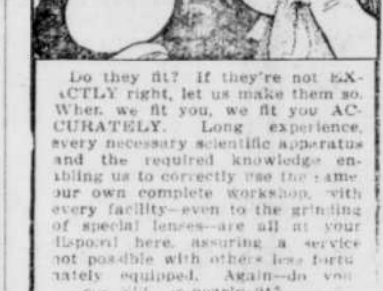
