Do not put off working up till summer or fall, and then kick because we have not got one. The time to work it up is now.

The normal school proposition will be before the people at the next general election, and it will be up to them to overstep this political trickery and demoralizing effects to any and all the schools.

There seems to be a misunderstanding among some people as to the rules under which the proportion of state taxes to be paid by each county is to be computed. The impression seems to prevail in places that the computation is to be made upon the assessed valuation of the county, and that this rule is to be in operation after a year or two. This is a mistake. The tax code enacted by the legislature (house bill No. 88) leaves the manner of computation as it is at present, and the ratio to be paid by each county until January 1912 will be the same as it is now.
