FOR A ROCK CRUSHER.

What the Candidates Have to Say
About the Matter.

After finding out from the city auditor
yesterday afternoon the names of the
candidates for the different city offices,
we endeavored to gain an expression
from them as to their stand on the rock
crusher question and here is what they
had to say, those were able to inter-
view:

"I am in favor of a rock crusher."
—Conrad Staffin.

"If a rock crusher is what we need for
the betterment of our streets, and
the city is able, then that is what I
want."—Sam Kay.

"I want our streets bettered, and con-
sider a rock crusher the only way of
solving the problem. I want good streets
and good work done to make them such.
We have found, by bitter experience,
that gravel is of no benefit. I want no
extravagance, but simply the best work
for the least money. This should be
looked at in a business light, and at-
tended to as such. We have a foundation
for crushed rock, and I believe it will be
an entire success, but I want first, a
thorough investigation as to the best
ways and means."—Mayor Biddle.

"I was one of the first promoters of
the rock crusher idea, and at one time
we thought we had one purchased. I
am still an earnest advocate of the idea.
The people all know where I stand on
the street improvement question."—A.
B. Muir.

"I am for a rock crusher. This ques-
tion should be settled by a vote of the
people, and then I stand ready to carry
out their wishes."—Ed Shaw.

"I am in favor of permanent street
improvement. I do not believe in ex-
pensing money unless we get value re-
ceived. I have made a study of street
improvement for the past two years and
find that vitrified brick and other pave-
ments are too expensive for a city of our
size, and in my opinion the crushed rock
is our only method. If I should be
elected I would surely favor the pur-
chase of a rock crusher and roller. It
is not worth while to discuss La Croix
gravel, as all know it is worthless."—F.
J. Coad.

"Dallas has arrived at a point where
she has got to make good streets or drop
out of sight. In my opinion a rock
crusher is the best solution of the prob-
lem."—H. B. Cooper.

MRS. M. J. MAGERS DEAD.

Well-Known Polk County Pioneer
Passes Away.

Mrs. Mary Jane Magers, widow of
the late Dr. W. B. Magers, died at her
home in Salem, Tuesday. She was
born in Ohio, in 1828 and at the time of
her death was 78 years old. Dr. Magers
and wife crossed the plains in 1852 and
first settled near Oregon City. They moved
from there to Corvallis and lived
there three years. The rest of their
lives has been spent in Polk and Marion
counties. For many years the family
lived on their Salt Creek farm and it
was there that their large family was
principally raised. Mrs. Magers was
widely known and was beloved by all
who knew her.

Mrs. Magers was the mother of 13
children. Of these the following survive:
J. E. Magers, of Portland; Sarah
E. Wordington, of Silverton; James P.
Magers, of Dallas; Frank M. Magers, of
Sisson, Cal.; Mary V. Fuller, Los
Angeles; George V. Magers, of Jelfer-
son; Ione M. Thompson, of Harrington,
Wash.; Albert G. Magers and Miss
Minetta Magers, of Salem. She became
a Christian in early life, and has been a
member of the Baptist church for many
years. She was a member of the Oregon
Pioneer Association, and always looked
forward with interest to the annual
meetings of this body.
