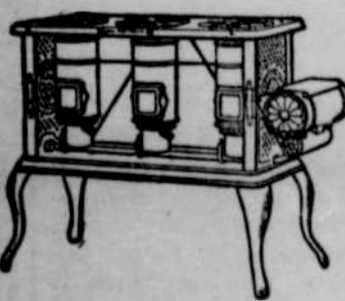
Patronize One Another for the Upbuilding of Town and County.

## TO INSTALL MOTORS.

Will Trim Lumber and Grind Flour by Electricity Instead of Steam.

The sun of the day of electrical power is fast rising in Polk county as is evidenced by the fact that very soon 30 horse power motor will be installed by the Williamette Valley Electrical Company for the Williamette Valley Lumber Company as an additional power to the mills in Dallas. The motor will be installed in the new flour mill machinery, and it is reported on good authority that the Dixie flouring mill in this county will in the near future have two motors, one 30 and one 20 horse power, installed for warehouse and grinding purposes, thereby doing away with water and steam. The water power is insufficient in summer and has to be supplemented every dry season by steam. An independent line of three and one half miles would have to be built, and what shows the progressive spirit of the Dixie people is a scheme said to be on hand to buy the water power and use the water for irrigating the lower valley of Lacrooke creek, already one of the most productive and beautiful portions of Oregon. It is claimed, that with irrigation, this will be a fine country for grain, grass and vegetables. The soil is already deep, black and alluvial, producing immensely without irrigation, but experiments made last season show that the season is hastened by the application of water and that vegetables, such as tomatoes and other things can be produced in quantities almost without limit.
