TO CRUISE POLK TIMBER.

Fuller & Elliott Get the Job at 41-2 Cents an Acre.

The county court has awarded the contract for cruising Polk county's 200,000 acres of timber land to Messrs. Fuller & Elliott, who will start the work about the first of next month and hope to have it completed by September 15th. They will employ a crew of from 8 to 12 men, composed of some five experienced cruisers, a transit man for each, and several packers and cooks. Mr. W. V. Fuller is well known all over our county as having much experience in this line, and the work could hardly have been allotted to a man who knows more about the timber in the county and a more equitable judge of what is fair and just between the timber owners and the assessment department of this county. Mr. Frank Elliott, the gentleman associated with Mr. Fuller, is also a man of vast and continued experience in cruising. Until lately he has been head cruiser for the Southern Pacific, and their fire warden for this district, but had tendered his resignation before taking up this work. That the county of the county will be well subserved is a foregone conclusion.
