COLLEGE COMMENCEMENT.

Large Crowds Witness the Many Interesting Exercises.

Last Thursday evening began one of the most interesting commencement weeks ever held by our popular college. Every evening has been replete with something more than of ordinary interest, the large crowds nightly attending bearing sufficient evidence to this effect. That evening was the occasion of an address by Dr. Kimball, dean of the Kimball school of theology. We hear tonight but praise of the effort.

Friday night the Philadelphia literary society gave its fourth annual program, which was original in the extreme and very pleasing to the large audience in the college chapel. The society afterwards had a banquet at the Hotel Dallas—a most enjoyable affair.

Saturday evening the young ladies and the Utopians, held the boards and pleased the audience even better than did the boys.

Sunday morning Dr. Mook preached the baccalaureate sermon, and it was masterly production in every respect and delivered in a manner which delighted and instructed his audience. At 3 o'clock that evening was the farewell meeting of the college Christian association, conducted by Prof. Metzger, and in the evening Dr. L. D. Dring delivered them an address on the subject of Opportunity. The length of this address detracted from its effect.

Monday evening Governor Chamberlain talked to the literary societies on the Duties of Citizenship. It was good talk and full of sound advice.

Tuesday evening Prof. William Caldwell exhibited the advancement of his pupils in the musical line, and the same was greatly appreciated by a large audience. Prof. Caldwell is surely to be congratulated upon the showing.

Wednesday morning the graduating exercises occurred and the programme was successfully rendered. The exercises, Music, Oration—"The Vision of Sir Launfal Applied", Frankie Hayter; Oration—"In Hoc Signo Vinces", Clarence M. Dabson; Oration—"A Call of the Present", Alta Savage; Oration—"The Winning Quality", W. Harrison Barwick; Solo, Ella Butler; Oration—"The Demand of the Present", Warren Critchlow; Oration—"Arrested Development", J. Dean Collins; Oration—"Pro Bono Publico", Orrie G. Arnold; Solo, Prof. Dunkleberger; Address to the Class, Rev. J. Bowersox; Conferring of Degrees and Presentation of Diplomas by the President; Music Mr. Barwick; Benediction.

The outlook for the coming campaign is promising, for through the non-partisan system of questioning candidates the people's rule has already been re-established or is in the final stages of establishment in twenty-five states, while nationally more than one-fourth the members of the National House are pledged. To continue the work and with increased power a National Initiative and Referendum Committee is being organized. It will question the candidates for Congress and the President, and will cooperate with Initiative and Referendum State Committees and with the existing Leagues and Federations. The strategic feature chiefly relied upon is the fact that candidates who will not pledge for more power in the people cannot secure their votes. The questioning of candidates will prevent an evasion of the issue. Hereafter in national campaigns the platforms of the conventions have determined the issues, but next year the questioning of candidates as to the initiative and referendum principle will make it the paramount issue. Machine rule is passing and soon will disappear.

A SPRINTER.

A Former Editor of the Itemizer Has a Son that Can Run.

The Oregonian of yesterday says of Graham Glass, junior, whose father formerly owned the Itemizer, and whose mother was born and raised here, she being Miss Laura Hagood, a sister of Mrs. E. C. Kirkpatrick: "Graham Glass, Jr., and 18-year-old student of Portland Academy, won the 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash and the championship of Oregon interscholastic schools for these events at the big meet in Corvallis last Saturday, getting a gold medal in each contest. In the half mile relay race he matched victory from Eugene High school by overcoming a 15-yard lead on the 220 yards of the relay in a most remarkable burst of speed, winning by a foot, and making the distance in 22.45 seconds—the track's record."

In the Portland interscholastic school meet, on Multnomah field, the previous Saturday, Glass won the 100-yard dash in 19.25 seconds on a hot start; the 220-yard dash in 23.35 seconds, and the broad jump at 19 feet 2.34 inches. It is said he can make the 100-yard in 14.5 if not in 10 flat.

This is a good going for one so young and practically without training. Young Glass will take his final examinations for Harvard on June 22nd, and if successful will be heard from on old Harvard's stadium the next few years. He graduates from Portland Academy June 14th.
