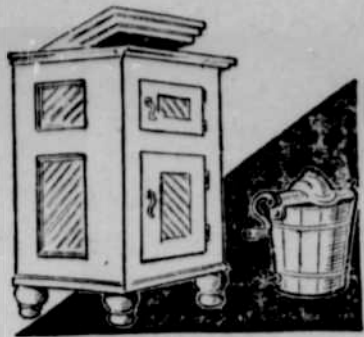

About \$1,200 Raised to Celebrate With.

Two Days of Joy With Lots of Amusements.

Three Bands Will Furnish Plenty of Music.

Balloon Ascension and Two Big Ball Games.

Excursion from McMinnville will Bring Big Crowd.

The executive committee and a number of the other committees concerned in our big celebration on July 2nd and 4th met last evening and formulated plans for the largest and best time that Polk county has ever known. The finance committee reported over \$1,000 already subscribed, which with the licenses, concessions, etc., will give them about \$1,200 toward expenses. Allotments were made for the different sections of expense and the whole matter thoroughly talked over and arranged for. In a few days the different committees are working most enthusiastically for a big and glorious celebration and the residents of Polk county can rest assured that they will be given the time of their lives.

The first day will be devoted to the Pioneer picnic exercises—the annual reunion of the Pioneer association of Polk county. In the morning Hon. Tilmon Ford, of Salem, will deliver an address, and there will be other interesting exercises. In the afternoon there will be a ball game and the annual meeting of the association. In the evening on the court house square the three bands in attendance will give a concert from 7 to 10 o'clock. During the day there will be other amusements features not yet entirely formulated.

The morning of the 4th will open with one of the largest parades ever held in Dallas, and contain many unique and entertaining features, chief among which may be noted the Calathumpians and floats prepared by our merchants. Liberal prizes will be offered for this parade, there being \$200, \$100, \$50 for the best floats. The exercises at the city park are as yet in an embryo state, but we will have a first class orchestra and the usual Calathumpians on occasion. In the afternoon the college campus will be the scene of all kinds of sports, for which liberal prizes will be offered and a baseball game, three teams competing during the two days for good prizes. Some time during the day there will be a balloon ascension, and Arnold will be here with his steam wing during both days.

In the evening there will be another band concert, races of all kinds on Main street, and the whole thing will conclude with a mammoth display of fireworks, for which \$250 has been allotted.

City water is to be piped to the park and seats for the old folks will be provided near the college, so that the pioneers may enjoy the sports as well as the rest of us. An open 4th will be the order and firecrackers unlimited, excepting the parade, together with plenty of confetti and other fun making possibilities.

On the 4th an excursion will be run here from McMinnville in order to give Yamhill residents a chance to attend a celebration. All signs now point to the largest crowd here that Dallas has ever known. Watch the paper, for further particulars as they develop.
