#### C. L. Starr Made Secretary of Normal Regents.

At the first meeting of the Normal school board of regents held in Salem yesterday to perfect organization, Mr. C. L. Starr, late county school superintendent of this county, and now editor of the Falls City News, was elected to the position of secretary, which carries with it an annual salary of \$1,800 a year. This board of regents was last week appointed by the governor, and are a commission created by the last legislature for the purpose of supervising all the normal schools of the state, and going away with the old board of regents. In Mr. Starr they will find a man well versed in school laws and duties, and perfectly capable of fulfilling the duties of the office with honor to the board and credit to himself. The appointment is also quite a feather in Polk county's cap, showing that the abilities of our favored sons are sometimes recognized, and the Itemizer hopes to see more of them filling positions of trust and honor.
