Just Common Cows.

Independence, Oregon.—Editor Pacific Homecoming: I am milking cows, but just common cows that I picked up anywhere. They were all fresh about the first of the year. I fed them vetch hay during the winter and ground vetch and oats. In my limited experience I consider that the best feed I have had is a Sharpshooter separator and sell our cream. Our cream checks for the five month beginning with January 1907, until the first of June amounted altogether to \$101.31. Besides, we churned about a gallon of cream a week for our own use and also used all the cream otherwise that we wanted. We are raising a nice bunch of hogs with the skin milk which I consider worth 25 cents per ewt.

FROM W. A. WASH.

Tells of Polkites Now in the State of California.

Berkeley, California, July 25 1907.
DEAR ITEMIZER:
We came down from Portland on the 11th of July, on the Columbia, just two weeks before it went to the bottom. The trip was in all respects a delightful one and took only 48 hours. I have once lived in this state and we all have visited here in recent years, it was not like coming into a strange country. I have met many old time friends and Mrs. Wash and Eva have found a good many Oregon acquaintances. Rev. A. A. Goodfriend and family, formerly of Dallas, live here and add, Rev. D. H. McCullagh and wife, of Sacramento, took dinner with us yesterday. Prof. Wann, of Monmouth, lives here and so do two of the Westons from Ballston. We are within ten miles of San Francisco and adjoining Oakland. This is the seat of the state university which Eva will enter next month. Its property is valued at \$25,000,000 and about 3000 students attend it. Berkeley is said to be the most desirable place of residence in California but property and living expenses are very high. The home we left in Dallas would here be worth \$10,000, and rent for \$80 a month. A single of eat-ables cost much more than with you and wages are correspondingly high. You read about how rapidly San Francisco is rebuilding, but there is still a broad area of desolation which will not be fully restored for years. You cannot imagine a sadder picture than the burned portion of the city. Much of its former business has moved to Oakland and thousands of its business people live in numerous outside towns. This is a great state but as I see it Oregon is destined to be a greater one and Portland is not only the Rose city but the Queen city of the great west. Tuesday we went with an excursion of 500 teachers to Santa Rosa to inspect the trees, plants and vegetables of the world famous Luther Burbank who has made 80 wonderful changes in many kinds of plant life by a great variety of crosses similar to those used in improving breeds of animals. It was not merely his sayings, but there were the evidence before our eyes. He has gradually changed worthless prickly cactus into valuable stock food and has evolved an edible plant out of common buckwheat. Seedless plums and a variety of new fruits are the result of his experiments. We formed his personal acquaintance and found him simple as a child while enthusiastically pursuing his grand work. In his line he has no superior. At another time I may write of California peculiarities.
