DEPOT FOR SUVER.

Polk County Farmers Who Ship
From That Point Appeal to
Railroad Commission.

A petition with seventy-one signatures was presented to the railway commission Saturday asking that conditions be remedied at Suver in the south of Polk county on the west branch of the southern Pacific. All the signers are citizens of the place and patrons of the railway company. The petition asks that the company be compelled to furnish a convenient depot at Suver, and if possible to appoint a station agent there. They claim that there is nothing at the place but an open shed with no platform of any kind; that goods perishable or otherwise are exposed to rain and other weather conditions before they are taken by the parties to their destination. They assert that this is very unfair considering the business that is done at the station. They ask, that in case it is not found convenient to erect a new depot with a regular agent in charge that one of the people in that vicinity be authorized to take charge of the freight on a commission basis.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Rock Crusher Matter up For Discussion.

Council met in regular session Monday night, with Mayor Mues in the chair. Present on roll call Councilmen Coad, Cooper, Grant, Shaw, and Sibley, Mayor, auditor and police judge, city attorney, city marshal and city surveyor. Absent councilmen VanOrsdel and Stratton. Minutes of regular meeting of July 16th and the special meeting of July 16th, were read and approved.

The city marshal reported that he had ordered the cleaning of streets and alleys as per order of the council, and that the order had been complied with, except in one or two instances.

Schneller & Sears were ordered to remove all debris from the rear of their stables, under penalty of fine.

Quarterly reports of auditor and police judge and city treasurer were submitted and referred to finance committee.

The city attorney reported the deed from the Boise heirs to the rock quarry site had been returned to him, and recommended that warrant be drawn in favor of the owners for \$42.40, the amount of purchase price.

D. C. Crider asked permission to erect a corrugated iron or steel building with rubberoid roof at intersection of Oak and Main streets. This matter was referred to committee on fire and water with full power to act in the premises.

Representatives from several different manufacturing concerns appeared before the council and gave much information and data regarding the use of rock crushers and rollers. A committee, composed of Councilmen Sibley, Coad and Grant, was appointed to take up the matter of the purchase of a rock crusher and roller for the city.

On motion of Sibley, the council adjourned.
