HAVE GREAT INFLUENCE.

What a Prominent Man says of the Value of the Press.

"You might think that what some country editor says does not amount to anything, but it means a good deal more than most people realize. When the country editor who is looking after nothing but the county printing gives expression to some rational idea about a national question, the mass of those in Congress knows that it comes from the grassroots. The lobby, the big railroad lawyers and that class of people realize the power of the press but they hate it. I have heard them talk about it and shake their heads and say, 'Too much power there! The press is more powerful than money.' This was not said in flattery, but because he had seen on the congressmen's desks the heaps of country weeklies, and he knew how closely they were read. The smallest editorial paragraph tells the politician of the condition in that paper's community, for he knows that it is not there because a editor has gathered the idea from some one whom he trusts as a leader, and the politician knows approximately who that leader is. So the country editor often exerts a power of which he knows little."
