OLD PIONEER DEAD.

Reuben C. Remington Goes to the Great Beyond.

Last Monday Reuben C. Remington, one of the best known men of this vicinity passed to his eternal rest. He has made his home close to Dallas for many years, and was respected highly for his probity and excellent qualities of heart and mind.
