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ANOTHER INDUSTRY.

The Axe Handle Factory Once More in Operation.

Chas. A. Hoff, recently from the east, has associated with him Messrs A. L. Dundas and Nol Gerlinger, and have leased and will at once put in operation Mr. Hoff is an experienced man in this work and will exercise entire supervision of the plant. He will at once put a boiler at work on land at Salt Creek, and thus be enabled to keep the factory supplied with bolts. A new 600 machine will be added to the present complement, and the forces necessary to handle the output increased to ten men. There is a great demand for axe handles and Mr. Hoff expects to keep his mill running all fall time, and add several hundred dollars a month to the pay roll of Dallas.

FROM CALIFORNIA.

Tells About the Big Trees in That Region.

Daunt, Cal. Aug. 19, 1907

Editor Itemizer: We are not in the habit of complaining to Uncle Sam, but we will say at the outset of our letter that we failed to receive the copy of the Itemizer containing our letter describing our visit to the big trees in which we told you that we would try to tell you something about the trees used to plant the lumber from the big trees. This forest of big trees is located east of Porterville about thirty miles and at an altitude of about six thousand feet. The trees are and is saved into lumber by an immense sawmill that will saw a log twelve feet in diameter, the lumber dropping into a flume from the mill and running away down the mountain to a dump where it is taken out and stacked by 50 or 60 men, where it remains until it is loaded. Then from four to six thousand feet are loaded on each wagon and from two to three of these wagons are coupled together like freight cars and drawn by teams consisting of from 12 to 16 head mules or horses and driven by a single man with a single line. From the dumps the teams bring the lumber to this place, a distance of about 12 miles where there is an immense planer employing from fifty to 75 men. Here the lumber is graded, run through the mills, prepared for the market, reloaded by men employed for that purpose and shipped to Porterville where it is loaded on freight cars and shipped to San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland and cities in the east. It may seem a little strange to you people of Oregon when I tell you that this lumber is worth from sixty to ninety dollars a thousand in Porterville. It is a well known fact here in California that no California producer is to be outdone by his neighbor, therefore when one of the owners of these large teams hauled to Porterville about 25,000 feet of lumber at one load, his ambitious friends, the Doty Bros, proposed to beat him, so he placed upon his wagon 50,000 feet of lumber and proceeded with it to Porterville where he landed all O. K., thus having hauled the largest load of lumber that was ever hauled in the state of California so far as I have ever heard. This load of lumber was drawn by 12 horses weighing about 1200 pounds each. If possible I will secure a picture of this load of lumber and would be pleased to know my impression of California by this time, therefore I will add favorable except too much heat and dust, but as this is the hot and dry part of the year they tell us we will have something better in that line in the near future. SPECIAL MEETING OF DADS.

The City Council Buy a Rock Crusher for Street Work.

As announced last week the city council met last Monday night sitting as a committee of the whole to consider the bids offered for rock crushers and rollers at its regular meeting. The bids on the rock crusher were found to range from \$1,200 to \$2,700 in round numbers. Bidder: Two firms, the Indiana Road Machine Company, of Fort Wayne, Indiana and Reel & Company, of Portland, submitted bids for furnishing new machinery. The Reiser Machinery Company, of Portland, offered figures on a second-hand crusher, but this was not considered by the council, as they wanted the best obtainable. It was decided to purchase a No. 9 Fort Wayne Steel crusher, capable of chawing up from 12 to 20 tons of rock an hour and the price to be paid is \$1348.75. The bids as submitted were:
