FILES FIRST REPORT.
Dallas and Falls City Railroad First to Comply With Order of State Commission.

The Salem, Falls City & Western railroad was the first to file its annual report with the state railway commission. According to the report placed in the hands of the commission yesterday, the company has a capital stock of \$100,000, and a funded debt of \$117,000. The road has 13 miles of track from Dallas to Black Rock and has trackage right from the Southern Pacific of 57 miles from Dallas to Newberg.

The company was organized October 24, 1901, under the laws of this state, and the directors of the company are: Louis Gerlinger, of Portland; Charles K. Spaulding, of Salem; and H. L. Pitcock, of Portland. The company has its general office at Portland, but the operating office is in Dallas. It began operation of track from Dallas to Newberg in November, 1906. The income account is given as follows:

Less operating expenses \$7,612.14
Income from operation \$66,872.61

Total deductions \$7,633.56
Net income \$59,239.05

The line has four locomotives in service; the passenger cars are equipped with automatic air brakes, hand brakes and automatic couplers. For its freight service it has 35 cars.

The cost of the road and equipment was \$306,807.80, or an average of \$23,600 a mile. As no dividends were paid, the net earnings are carried as surplus.

A BAREFAID PREPARATION.

A writer in the September issue of the A. O. U. W. Reporter in speaking of the late raise in rates of the Woodmen of the World, says that such was made necessary as its benefit fund during the past year was not sufficient to meet the death losses. This is the second or third time we have seen this statement made in the press, and as a loyal Woodman, my editor desires to give it the lie direct. At no time in our history has our benefit fund been incapable of meeting our death losses in full, in fact just the opposite is true. There has always been a good working balance in this fund, so much so indeed that we frequently have money to turn into the reserve fund, as is provided by our laws when this surplus reaches \$25,000.

The same writer in his letter makes another statement which we coincide with:

"The justice of this raise in rates cannot fail to be evident to every thinking man, for in a fraternal order, on a co-operative basis, there should be no favored classes. In that order those members who joined after the raise in rates were paying practically twice as much for the same protection as those who joined before. In fact, many thousands of men were induced to join the order prior to the raise in rates, simply to take advantage of them. These men are probably kicking themselves now as easy marks, but they ought to realize that the order has carried them for several years for much less than the men who joined the next day after the raise."

Has Lost His Glad Rags.

A Portland paper has this to say of Dallas people regarding a fire there Tuesday: Mrs. Chester V. Hare, wife of a well-known barber, arrived at the cleaning works after the fire, greatly perturbed, as her best dress and her husband's Sunday clothes had been sent to the establishment to be cleaned. Mrs. Hare's gown, however, was in a glass case in the place and was not even wet. Hare was not so fortunate, as his 'glad rags' were burned full of holes and soaked with water.
