SPLIT UP LEAGUE.

Dallas College Basketball Team to Play With Three Teams.

Captain Edgar Craven and Manager Frank Kerev went to Salem Tuesday to attend a meeting of the basketball league. On the score of economy it was decided to divide the league, thus reducing expenses by playing with the teams nearest home. The patrons of the game here are exceedingly jubilant over the prospects for a better team than ever this year. Four of the old players are to be in it again and some very promising material is being developed from new students. This year's team will probably line up with Ned Shaw, Carl Fenton, Edgar Craven and Tracy Savery of the old team, the fifth man to be either Morton, Simonton or Cland Shaw. An extra good second team is also assured, but we can not give the players as yet. A Salem paper gives the following account of the league meeting: The second annual meeting of the Oregon State Basketball League, was held in the local Y. M. C. A. rooms yesterday afternoon. Delegates were present from six colleges and Y. M. C. A. bodies comprising the league. Plans for the coming season's tournament were drawn and it was decided to divide the league into two sections, instead of one, as last year. Upon formal application the Oregon Agricultural college and Pacific University were permitted to join the league, which is now composed of eight teams. The district has been divided into two divisions to be known as the North and South divisions, and they will compose the following teams: North—Pacific University, Pacific College, M. A. A. C. and Portland Y. M. C. A. South—Salem Y. M. C. A., Dallas College, Willamette University and O. A. C. The winning teams of the two divisions will contest for the championship of the league at the close of the series.

The officials selected to serve during the season are: Bert Teets and Walter Ford, Dallas; Jim and Charles Mackey and Andrew Forbes, Portland Y. M. C. A.; Dr. Thornton and James McCord, M. A. A. C.; Z. Tharp, Professor Coons and William Wilson, Pacific College; W. C. Winslow and Frank Grannis, Willamette University; Perry Jones, Salem Y. M. C. A. Each team will pay its own expenses when traveling to and from scheduled games. A meeting will be held here November 2, when a schedule of games will be arranged, the first game of which will be played after December 10th.

The two winning teams playing off the championship will be required to play three games, one each on the home floor, and if the third game is played it will be upon a neutral floor. The receipts for admission are to be divided, 60 and 40 per cent, respectively.
