GRAND JURY TO MEET

November 29th for Their Regular Two Year Session.

Once every two years the prosecuting attorney must call a session of a grand jury just prior to the regular term of court to set as such and investigate such matters as may come before for consideration. Sheriff Fiske is today in Grand Ronde subpoenaing members of that body to appear in Dallas on November 29th, the circuit court holding on December 2nd. The petty jury list should have been drawn last Tuesday, but Clerk Smith could not do so, owing to the holidays. He has until the 22nd to do so, however, and it is supposed that by that time we will again be able to do business in all the departments of justice.

WHAT FLAGS SIGNIFY

As Relating to Diseases of a Contagious Nature.

Editor Itemizer: The other day I noticed in town a white flag hung out in front of a residence, and will have to confess my ignorance as to its meaning. Of course I am aware that it is a symbol for a cessation of hostilities in time of war, but do not think it would apply in the case mentioned. I suppose it refers to some disease, but am not certain, and as a newspaper man is supposed to know about everything, I refer the matter to you, with a polite request for an immediate answer through the columns of your paper and widely read compendium of public information.

INQUIRER.

By inquiry at the office of Health Officer Cary, we learn that the flag mentioned refers to a case of typhoid fever—the only one in town, and the first for a very long time. We were also informed as to the meaning of flags generally, as referring to diseases, as follows:
White flag—Typhoid fever.
Red flag—Most any contagious disease not otherwise designated.
Yellow flag—Smallpox.
Black flag—The black plague, or death.

NO INSTRUMENT FILED.

Tuesday the First Day in Many Years for Such a Thing to Happen.

On last Tuesday not an instrument of any kind was filed with County Clerk Smith for record. This is something that has never happened before during his term of office, and in all probability for many years before that, we expect since the county was in its infancy. In fact our court officials are having an easy time of it with no business whatever to transact, but as an offset they are not able to draw their monthly stipends, and will not be able to do so until the county court is able to hold its regular November session, which should have convened last week. It makes it rather hard on the newspaper man too. With all the courts tied up, news is scarce, hardly anything offering except marriage licenses, and they do not fill up much space. All instruments offered the clerk are filed and recorded, but in some counties not even that is being done.
