SILETZ HOMESTEADS.

Ruling Made By General Land Office on P. A. Finseth's Claim.

A decision was rendered November 12th by the General Land Office which will effect about 900 homestead entries, comprising, perhaps, 50,000 acres in the former Siletz Indian Reservation. The ruling referred to was made in the case of Peter A. Finseth, against whose entry an affidavit of contest was recently filed. The claims have been held up for the alleged reason that the settlers did not dwell on the land, as required by the homestead act. It is held that applications to contest entries in the Siletz will not be allowed hereafter, as a matter of course, but all such applications will be referred back to a special agent for investigation and for his approval or disapproval. This means that when an entryman has complied with the law in the opinion of the special agent, he will recommend that the application to contest be denied. In all such cases the entryman will get their patents a year or two earlier than they would if they had first to defend a contest through the various offices to the Secretary of the Interior.

The former Siletz Reservation comprises six full townships, and embraces 1440 claims of 160 acres each. It was thrown open to settlement by proclamation of President Cleveland on July 25, 1865. It was opened by authority of the act of August 15, 1864, which ratified the treaty of the Indians, ceding the lands to the United States, and at the same time provided for the disposition of the lands by the government under the homestead act only.

Mrs. Nancy Harris Dead.

At the family home at Oak Grove, Polk County, Oregon, Monday, November 18, 1907, Mrs. Nancy Harris died of heart failure and diseases attendant upon old age. She was aged 85 years. The deceased was the widow of Hugh Harris, who preceded her to the grave several years ago. She was born in Illinois, and came to Oregon in 1853, settling upon the farm where she has since resided almost continuously. The funeral was held from the Oak Grove church Monday, conducted by the Rev. W. H. Selbeck. Interment was made in the Old Fellows' cemetery at Salem, where services were held.
