COUNCIL MEETS.

They Allow Bills and Pass Resolutions.

The city council met in regular session last Monday evening, with the entire staff present with the exception of Councilmen Cooper and Shaw. Action was deferred for two weeks until the city engineer could locate a certain monument.

Bilyeu & Sparks were granted a saloon license for six months.

The hearing was closed on the sidewalk advertised last week and the street commissioner instructed to go ahead with the building of the same.

A resolution was passed providing for the borrowing of \$4,000 for the paying of the rock crusher and steam roller, and the expense of it. About \$1,853 of this has already been paid by city warrants drawing interest, and the treasurer was instructed to call in these warrants and pay them off. The new warrants will be divided into five, payable in one, two, three, four and five years, or sooner, and not over 6 per cent to be paid for the use of the money.

Bids were ordered called for on the building of the cement walk in front of the Weinhart property on Main street.

LARGE WALNUT ORCHARD.

J. B. Stump Sets out 175 Acres to English Walnuts.

J. B. Stump, of Monmouth, is interested in general farming and is representative of a large number of the farmers of that district. He had 140 acres in oats in 1907 and threshed out 9000 bushels or an average of 57 bushels to the acre. Mr. Stump is a specialist on livestock, and has some fine animals. He has a large flock of sheep and last year shipped about 2000 bucks. Orchard culture is interesting Mr. Stump now, and he has just set out 175 acres to English walnuts. The trees have been planted 60x40 feet apart, and between the rows Mr. Stump has planted 420 Royal Ann cherries, which he figures will bear a good crop for several years before the walnuts are large enough to spoil them by their shade.
