February 1st the Normal girls will play baseball with the Chinaman girls. The game will doubtless prove an interesting one and draw a large crowd. The Independence Athletic club baseball team easily defeated the Capital Normal College team, of Salem, Friday night at the auditorium. The final score was not nearly so close as anticipated, the score being 44 to 14. A bunch of local Knights of Pythias visited the anniversary of the Falls City lodge. Those attending from Independence were Hill, W. V. Bice, of New Kurrie, Will Ceckle, A. Moore and Michael Goetz. E. H. Young sold a few days ago his residence to Wm. Dawes, of Shelley, Montana. Mr. Dawes has been engaged in the livestock business a few years in Montana and comes here to reside permanently. He has a family and has returned to that state to bring them here. Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Davidson entertained the Independence orchestra January 22nd at their home on Monmouth street. About thirty five young people were present and the orchestra furnished music for dancing, which was a feature of the evening. Refreshments were served and a very enjoyable evening had by all present. There has been some activity the past week in the hop market and C. L. Fitch and his picked up a good string of hops which will be shipped to eastern brewers. He purchased from W. W. Percival 400 bales paying 75 cents, from Geo. Whiteaker 90 bales at 65 cents. The market is a little stronger at present. There are not many hops left in this section now and a trifle better prices doubtless would soon clean out the 1907 crop. Homer lodge Knights of Pythias is making arrangements to entertain the district convention of K. P. lodge in this district. At the convention Falls City, Dallas, Corvallis, Albany, Lebanon, Salem, Hubbard, and other sister lodges will be represented. The boys of the local lodge are going to give their visiting brothers the time of their lives and will leave nothing undone to make the convention a success in every particular. A banquet will be a feature of the gathering and it is anticipated that fully and possibly more than a hundred visitors will be with the lodge at the convention. It is no small undertaking to entertain the district K. P. convention but the boys here are equal to the occasion and they are planning to make the occasion a big boost for the order. The funeral services of T. A. Ireland took place at the family home south of Monmouth Saturday afternoon, Rev. E. C. Wignour, pastor of the Christian church at Monmouth officiating. Interment followed and took place in the cemetery south of Monmouth. Mr. Ireland's death occurred at his home two miles south of Monmouth on Thursday, January 23, 1908. He was taken suddenly ill with pneumonia on Friday evening the week previous and passed quietly away the following Thursday. Mr. Ireland was a well-known and highly esteemed citizen of Polk county having resided here for about forty years. He was born in Jackson county, Indiana, in 1842, and moved from there to Iowa where he was married on March 27, 1864, to Miss N. L. Brummet. Mr. and Mrs. Ireland started the same year across the plains to Oregon and since then he has lived on his farm south of Monmouth. The death of his wife occurred two years ago. The deceased leaves a family of six children and a host of friends made through his long residence in Polk county to mourn his loss.

Dallas Merchants Agree to Shut up at 6:30.

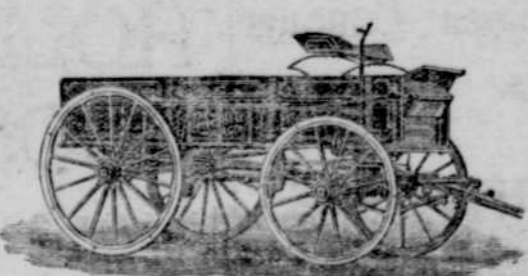
