CANNERY MEETING.

Many Stock Holders Turn Out to Perfect Organization.

A large majority of our cannery stock holders turned out at the cannery meeting at the court house Saturday afternoon to perfect organization and to discuss matters of benefit to the corporation. J. B. Nunn, Wesley Elliott and Dee Dunn were appointed as incorporator and directed to prepare and file articles of incorporation with the secretary of state and county clerk, in the manner provided by law. This matter was attended to Monday and the Dallas Cannery and Packing company is now a recognized and business going body. The above was the name voted for by the company, the capital stock being placed at \$5,000.

A set of stock books will now be opened for signatures, and certificates of stock are now in the hands of the printer. Another meeting has been called for one week from next Monday when it is expected everything will be in readiness for the final signing up, and set of constitution and by-laws ready for adoption. Permanent officials will then be elected, prominent among which will be the board of directors, who will have actual supervision of all the cannery business. There being no further business that could be attended to at that time the meeting adjourned. Considerable more uncollected stock has been filed in, and we append a full list of all stock holders.

OLD TIMER DIES.

Oldest Masonic Member of Independence Lodge.

John M. Mitchell, one of Independence's oldest citizens, died at his home Monday afternoon, after a few weeks' illness, following a general decline. Mr. Mitchell was born in Vienna, Me., September 27, 1822, being 86 years old at his death. He spent his early years in the East, and in 1853, in Kingsfield, was married to Miss Wealthy Otis. In 1850 he moved to Lowell, Mass., where he engaged in the manufacture of sashes and doors. After four years he returned to his native state and settled in Dexter. A few years later he moved to Litchfield, Me., where he built the first residence of that place. In 1859 he moved to California, settling in Cloverdale. He was engaged in business in two or three towns of California until 1879, when he came to Oregon, locating in Independence, and continuing in the manufacture of sashes and doors until 1898, at which time he retired from active business. He attended to the management of his private business, however, up to the time of his death.

He was the oldest member of the Independence Masonic lodge, having been a Mason for the past fifty years. He is survived by his aged widow, who is now past 80 years old; by two daughters, Mrs. Flora Spurr, of San Francisco, and Mrs. Nettie Bohannon, and by three granddaughters. Funeral services were held at the residence Monday afternoon at 1:30, with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.
