## FORMER DALLAS RESIDENT

### Tells of His New Home in Multnomah County.

Lents, Oregon, Feb. 24, 1908.

Dear Itemizer: We have been back from California for two months, and Oregon is good enough for us. Our present home is six miles southeast of the court house in Portland on the Mt. Scott electric railway line over which two cars train run every 20 minutes from daylight to midnight. At least 12,000 people live in this settlement around nearly a dozen stations, including Arleta, Filand, Nashville, Trenton and Woodmere. The fare from Portland to any point on the line is 5 cents, and a big part of our people work in the city. There are many elegant homes and good people who greatly enjoy their semi-rural life. We have 13 acres of land which has doubled in value within two years and will soon command over \$500 per acre, but is not for sale at this time. We are farming on a small scale, and are preparing to plant six acres of potatoes. All three of us greatly enjoy our out-of-door experiences. We live on a rural delivery route a mile from Lents.

## SUCCUMBS TO PARALYSIS.

### Mrs. O. H. Cobb Passes to the Great Beyond after an Illness of Several Months.

Sabrina T. Cobb, the wife of O. H. Cobb and an old and respected resident of Dallas, died Sunday night, aged 63 years, after a long illness, her death being caused by paralysis of the heart. Mrs. Cobb was a daughter of John and Sarah McNeil, and was born in Meigs county, Ohio, September 25, 1844. From Ohio she moved to Sutton, Clay county, Nebraska, in 1873, and was married to O. H. Cobb, April 19, 1877. Mr. and Mrs. Cobb came to Oregon in 1880 and settled in Dallas, where they resided until the time of her death. She joined the church at the age of 14 years, and was a member of the United Brethren church until she came to Oregon. She then became an earnest and active member of the Methodist church, in which she remained until her death. She is survived by a husband and four children, they being George and Will Cobb, Mrs. Mabel Martin, of Dallas, and Mrs. Minnie Laper, of Anvity, and a brother and sister, R. C. McNeil and Mrs. B. E. Towse, both of Meigs county, Ohio. The funeral was held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, and the body was taken to the Odd Fellows' cemetery for burial. Mrs. Cobb was a woman well known and loved among the people of Dallas and vicinity, and died deeply regretted by the bereaved husband and relatives.

## O. A. C. NOTES.

In the Freshman class trout for medals in the 4-mile cross country run here last Saturday, two Polk county boys won places; Grant McLaughlin of Independence, getting first and Percy Dodd, of Falls City, second place.

Our weekly newspaper heads its front page with "Dallas Wins From O. A. C. Championship of the State League," and gives much credit to the fast bunch from Dallas college—a small school but one thorough in its instruction.

Messrs Lee Penton and Frank Coad, with their better halves, spent last Friday afternoon viewing the grounds and improvements previous to the arrival of the 130 Dallasites on the 6:30 excursion.

The college vineyard has about 60 varieties of grapes of bearing age. This year about 40 more of tried varieties will be tried for experiment and instruction to the ranchers of the state.

As preliminary training for the Mechanical and Electrical courses in Freshman wood work, and with those of other courses taking it, the enrollment reaches 100. This keeps the shops busy for eight hours a day, and later a shift may work Saturdays.

Last Saturday the 138 boy delegates to the Boys' Conference had a royal time. Coming from all parts of the state they enjoyed the city, the college grounds, and took an hour in the afternoon to show off their athletic abilities in field and track work.

The Southern Pacific Co. are making some extensive improvements in their depot here, it having become necessary to enlarge it on account of the rapidly growing business.
