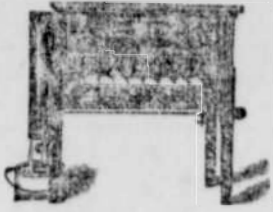

THE SINGLE TAX AND THE PRODUCER

H. D. WAGNON, IN THE PORTLAND LABOR PRESS, TELLS HOW THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT WOULD AFFECT THE LABORER AND THE FARMER.

The single tax would raise wages by opening up land so the people could employ themselves and thereby relieve the labor market. The single tax would reduce rent by bringing more land into use for homes, and encourage building of houses by exempting them from taxation. The single tax would break up land monopoly and give the man who works with his hands a chance to have a home of his own.

The single tax would give wealth to him who works, to him who makes wealth, instead of the landlord who takes all the wealth that labor makes. The man who labor with their hands have made all the land values of Portland and everything else worth having, and what have they to show for all their labor?

Suppose all the men who own no land were to leave Portland, what would the land then be worth to its owners? Who will get the benefits from the building of the great packing plant? Will it not be the land owners, who have now advanced the price of lots near the site 100 per cent in expectation that a man who works with their hands will need this land to live on, and raise their children?

The single tax would make this land cheap to the man who wanted to make use of it, and the sordid land speculator could not well afford to hold it out of use as he does now, and make labor come to his terms.

New York has had a rent strike in the tenement district, and the landlord and his court have evicted the poor workers by the thousands. Had the single tax been in vogue in New York those workers would not now be in poverty, but would own the homes now rented at exorbitant rates.

The single tax would settle the child labor question. No father or mother would send their children to work in the mills if they could support them with the wages of the father.

The single tax would give the children of the laboring man their playtime, with better schools and better clothes to wear to school.

One Portland block, 200 feet square, bounded by Washington, Alder, Third and Fourth streets, is worth \$3,000,000. This would buy 64,000 acres of farm land at \$50 per acre. That amount of land would make a strip one mile wide and 100 miles long. The ownership of this city block is the same as the owning of many shares, as it takes an army of working men to pay the ground rent.

(One prominent class of opponents to the so called single tax amendment is those who know nothing of the single tax philosophy, but think it is something bad because they have heard someone say that it means to tax land only. That, they think, would put all the taxes on the farmer, when, in fact, the single tax would benefit the farmer

more than it would any other class. The farmer can be forced all the time, and is now measured it with the dollar, and since the single tax proposes to tax land according to its value, the most taxes would be levied on the land in the cities. Portland has more dollars' worth of land than all the rest of the state. This is about the way you find land values:

Portland and suburbs . . . 62 per cent
Railroad land and franchises . . . 8 per cent
Timber and grazing land . . . 5 per cent
Other cities . . . 15 per cent
Farm land . . . 10 per cent

Under the single tax Portland and the other cities would pay 77 per cent of the taxes; railroad and timber land 15 per cent; farmers, 10 per cent. When you hear a man on a paper saying the tax is something to hurt the farmer, you can put him down as a man who knows nothing about the single tax or he is a knave who is interested in "padding" the land monopoly and is trying to fool the "poor farmer," whom the land monopoly has enslaved through all the ages.

The land monopolist thinks the farmer can be forced all the time, and is now banking on the ignorance of the farmer by telling him that the object is to exempt the rich manufacturer from taxes. The facts of the case are that every land monopolist and all who are fighting this amendment would be whooping it up for exempting manufacturers from taxation if that alone were submitted, because they know the growth of manufacturing would boom their land around the plants.

Don't be afraid of the logic man, Mr. Farmer. He has always been used to seeing the innocent children, and is now rushing to defend you are the same crowds who have profited off the railroads and other monopolies, while the same railroads and monopolies have been fleecing you for the past generation.

A 10 per cent reduction in the pay of all employees of the Boston & Maine Railroad who receive more than \$100 a month, has been declared by President Tuttle, of the road. Business depression is given as the cause.
