and intellectual man. At this place the main cannery building is 6x100 feet with two large sheds with very good foundations, so as to be used as a store room for canned goods, and are connected with the main building. This plant, including building, machinery and grounds as it stands, cost \$7,000, and has a cannery capacity of from 5,000 to 7,000 cans per day. From there we went to Newberg to look over the plant that is going in at that place, and which will be one of the largest cannery plants on the coast when completed. We had the pleasure of meeting the manager, Mr. Wilson, who not only showed us through the cannery, but other places of importance about the town. The main cannery here is 100x240 long, with driveway full length on one side for wagons, and a side track full length on the other side; there will also be a boiler house 40x60 feet. This plant, when completed, will cost \$15,000 or more. The building alone will cost \$9,000. The machinery is not in the plant yet, but it is supposed to be in ready for this season's run. On last Friday and Saturday we made a trip to Brownsville to see the much talked of \$1,500 cannery at that place, as our intention was to see it now organized, was not in position to build a cannery plant that would cost very much money. We arrived in Brownsville about the middle of the afternoon, and by walking about two miles from the depot found Mr. Ed. Hallaway, the manager, one of the principle stockholders, hard at work spraying his young apple orchard. He quit his work and hitched up and took us to the cannery, and put in until dark with us, and giving us all the necessary information. Here we noted that the cannery had been in operation only one season. To start in with, the company bought a vacant building that they thought could be used for a cannery building. They fitted this with machinery and began the season's run. The building and machinery installed cost about \$3,000. They had not run long until they had to have more room, and also discovered that their building was not adapted to their purpose, so they soon they would be compelled to have more room immediately, and that they very much needed an up-to-date cannery building, and before the season was half over they laid the foundation for a building to be 60x140 feet, and put up about half of it at that time, and later on had to put up a temporary shed to afford them enough room, and their building is so full now we could scarcely get through it. Mr. Hallaway informed us that they would tear out their vats, trays and some other machinery. This plant, when completed, this year including the ground and what was paid out last year, will be \$7,000 or more. Mr. Hallaway told us that he had thrown away a great deal of money by fooling with this old building and cheap machinery, and advised us by all means to not make the mistake that he did by trying to start the cannery business too cheap. I have a great deal more that I could tell you along this line, but have neither time nor space to do so. There will be a meeting of stockholders on Monday, March 16th, at 2 o'clock, at which time all stockholders as well as other persons interested are urged to be present. The matter of increasing the capitalization of the company to \$10,000 as well as other important matters will be brought up. Yours for a cannery.
