**CITY COUNCIL MEET**

TRANSACTIONAL BUSINESS.

Judges and Clerks are Appointed for City Election.

The City Council met in adjourned session last Thursday evening, with all the councilmen present.

On motion of Councilman Grant, the City Marshal was instructed to see that all streets in the city are kept free of trash and garbage.

Claim of C. L. Hubbard, city marshal was ordered paid in the sum of \$25.00; other claims were ordered paid as follows:

D. A. Madison was granted a saloon license to run six months from March 13, 1908, with I. F. Yoakum and Oscar Holmes, as sureties on his bond.

The ordinance concerning the planting of trees in park strips was laid over until next regular meeting.

The ordinance prohibiting minors from loitering in pool rooms was put to vote, but failed to pass.

The street commissioner was instructed to notify all property owners in the city of Dallas to move their sidewalks to the line as laid down in the official plats of the city.

On motion of Sibley, the council adjourned.

Visitors to California Prefer Conditions in Oregon.

Seth Riggs, a well-known farmer of Polk county, residing near Riekerall, and a property-owner of Portland, returned last Wednesday night from a prolonged tour of California, covering nearly two months. He visited every city of importance from San Diego to San Jose, besides making a careful study of the conditions of the country tributary to these cities, only to be convinced that we in Oregon have no call to go to any part of California with the expectation that we are going to find anything better than our own state affords. As to the "climate" in the "Sunny Southland," Mr. Riggs maintains that if the weather of the last two months affords a basis for judgement, there is no danger of Oregon suffering by comparison.—Oregonian.

**POLK SOCIALIST MEETING**

REFUSE TO ADOPT RESOLUTIONS.

Everything Brought up Before the Meeting was Turned Down.

The socialists of Polk county held a mass meeting Saturday, the 7th. J. K. Sears was made chairman and A. Syron secretary.

After a display of oratorical ability by several of the members, a committee on platform and resolutions was appointed consisting of T. V. B. Embree, chairman, F. W. Miller and W. T. Barnhart. The meeting adjourned, and convened again at 1 o'clock to hear the report of the committee on platform.

The following platform was reported by the committee, which on a motion to adopt, was voted down:

First, we, the socialists of Polk county, Oregon, declare

First, we favor direct legislation, the election of all officers by the people, the right of recall.

Second, the necessities of life on the free list; import duties to be laid upon luxuries, and for revenue only.

Third, the repeal by congress of all laws creating federal courts.

Fourth, public utilities to be owned by the public and operated for the benefit of the public.

Fifth, we favor an eight hour law for labor.

Sixth, we believe in the right of labor to organize for its own protection.

Seventh, we believe in the right of free speech, free press and free ballot.

Eighth, we favor equal suffrage for both sexes.

Ninth, we endorse the National Socialist platform.

Tenth, we favor placing out a full county and state ticket.

Eleventh, we invite all parties to investigate and study socialism.

J. K. Sears, chairman, took the floor and made a furious and strong talk against the adoption of the platform and he was supported by several of the orthodox members. T. V. B. Embree made desperate efforts to secure the adoption of the platform but he was beautifully snowed under by the contending forces. The Dr. then introduced the following resolutions which were overwhelmingly defeated:

Resolved, that we the Socialists of Polk county, believe in the principle of a United States senators by a direct vote of the people, therefore, be it resolved, that we mutually pledge each other that we will not vote for any candidate for the legislature who will not pledge himself to vote for the people's choice, as expressed at the polls, first and last.

Resolved, further, that we will use all honorable and legitimate means to defeat any candidate for the legislature who is opposed to statement No. 1 and who shall attempt to explain its meaning as an idle pledge which can be construed different from its true letter and spirit.

Be it further resolved, that we ask all socialists of the state of Oregon to unite with us in upholding the primary election law, which give to the voters of Oregon the nearest approach of electing a united states senator by a direct vote of any other state in the union.
