Johnny Kennedy, formerly of Bothell, retired from his farm on Pine creek and now lives in Corsica surrounded by all the comforts of life. His brother, Clayton, formerly the wooden-legged blacksmith of Monmouth, was for years postmaster at Palouse, Washington. His son, Lot, is manager for the Barrett interests at Portland, Oregon. Adelle Kennedy is now the wife of Lige Whitman, a prosperous Whitesman Co. farmer. Mr. Whitman was a Monmouth ball player in the days when Harry Cooper, John Levi, Winnie and Dick Scott, Frank and Chet Coal and Al and Will Lytle were so hard to beat as Dallas ball players. Henry Tatom, formerly of Monmouth, is in the grocery business in Rosalia. He is healthy, happy and prosperous. An Oregon girl is his wife. Lottie Fainehn, who married Chas. Randle, lives in Pullman, Washington, where 1300 students attend the Washington State College and School of Science. Her two daughters attended the school, and she is now teaching while Edith is attending the Blair Business School in Spokane. Lester Robbins, son of John Robbins, who lived beyond the old Hallock's saw mill from Dallas, is rooming with my son and attending the Pullman school. They take military drills, and will go to Spokane in May for their encampment. W. E. Richardson, who graduated at Monmouth along with Prince Campbell, studied law and was for several terms joint judge for Spokane and Stevens counties. John McKnight who lived on the Lindsey Robbins place east of Dallas, died, and his wife, the daughter of Simeon Sanders, lives in Spokane. Her brother, John O., married and lives at Carstairs, Alberta. He wrote me he had one boy, one girl and one little Canadian, but that he is coming back as that country is cold on the 'orses and freezes the 'ens hegs. FROM MR. WASH.

Lents, Oregon, March 16, 1908. Dear Itemizer: Once again I come with a few new notes. Every few days I see some one from old Polk and they seem almost like kindreds. This region is from four to six miles southeast of the center, Portland, has a population of over 10,000 and several hundred new houses are going up within its bounds. Town lots command from \$20 to 400 and adjacent acreage about double that. Our 13 acres which is within half a mile of two electric car lines could now be sold for \$6,000, but is not on the market. By the end of this week we will have planted sixty bushels of early seed potato on six acres of it, including three choice varieties for early market. The names are, Gold Coin, Money Maker and American Wonder, they having cost us about 50 cents a bushel. Next fall our potato ground is to be set out in strawberries, small fruit men saying it is choice location. We hope to realize enough on our potato crop to clear the balance of our land at a cost of about \$50 per acre. I say we because my wife and daughter are full partners and we expect to greatly enjoy the outdoor work. Eva is teaching in Oregon City at \$60 a month, one of her directors, being John F. Clark, from Spring Valley. As we lived in Dallas for nineteen years and know nearly everybody in the county we cannot help feeling an interest in that section. W. A. WASH.

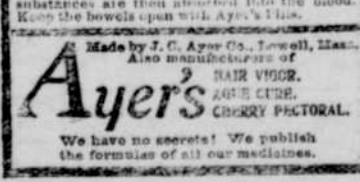
