MEN OF POLK WHO SEEK THE OFFICES.

Candidate Roster Shows There Will be hot Times in the old County.

Both the Republicans and the Democrats have about completed their party tickets in Polk county. Warm contests are in progress for nomination at the primaries for several of the offices.

For representative, C. L. Hawley, of Bethel, is the Republican aspirant with no opposition within the party for the nomination. He is silent regarding statement No. 1.

W. D. Henry, of Spring Valley, will be the Democratic nominee, and will stand unopposed for statement No. 1.

For county judge, G. O. Holman, of Bridgeport, and Ed F. Coad, present incumbent, are after the Republican nomination.

J. E. Sibley, of Dallas, formerly county judge, and J. G. Van Orsdel, also of Dallas, are contesting for the Democratic nomination.

For county clerk, E. M. Smith, present incumbent, is after the third term, and will be opposed in the primaries by S. H. Portwood, of Monmouth, both Republicans.

Fred Crowley, a young school teacher of Falls City, and A. N. Robinson, city recorder of Independence, are the Democratic candidates for this office.

For sheriff, J. M. Grant, present Democratic incumbent, will probably have no opposition, as he is satisfactory to both parties.

For commissioner, William Riddell, Republican, will try for reelection and will likely have no opposition either at the primaries or at the election in June.

For assessor, Carl S. Graves, present Republican incumbent, is a candidate for re-nomination, with no opposition.

For school superintendent, H. C. Seymour, present incumbent, will have no opposition for the Republican nomination. There are as yet no Democratic aspirants for this office.

For surveyor, B. F. Beazley, of Falls City, is after the Democratic nomination. Ross Winslow, present Republican incumbent, has not as yet declared his intention to make a contest for the place.

R. L. Chapman, present county coroner, will likely have no opposition for the place.

H. Holman and D. P. Stouffer, both of Dallas, are after the Republican nomination for treasurer. Ed C. Dunn will likely be the Democratic nominee.

Registration so far amounts to about 1,300 voters. Of these 700 are Republicans and 500 Democrats, the remainder are divided among the Socialists, Prohibitionists and Independents.
