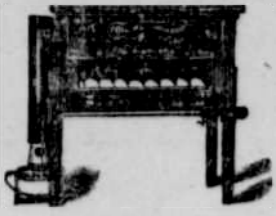

SHERIFF GETS BOARDER.

ONE NAMED JOHNSON PULLED FOR THEFT.

Arrested by Sheriff Grant Saturday Night.

Polk county's jail got an occupant Saturday night for the first time for a long period, in fact the money derived from the board of prisoners at this institution does not bring in the sheriff enough recompense to be worthy the trouble of listing it among the really bon ton hostleries of the state. Most any old country hotel could beat it for accommodations, especially for people who desire exercise of any considerable quantity, after their meals and the exhilarating society of their fellow man. The menu and sleeping quarters are wholesome and neat and clean, yet the Hotel de Grant continues not a popular stopping place, in fact it is not patronized by any of our best people. We hate to give any place of rest so black an eye, but its so pronounced lack of popularity constrains us to make these few remarks, and none of our tax payers seem to bewail the fact that it remains without a regular boarder most of the time. This speaks well for the taste of our citizens while not detracting from the fair fame of our sheriff as a caterer to his guests.

E. C. Johnson, wanted on a charge of stealing a horse from a farmer of the Mission bottom, near Salem, was taken into custody by Sheriff Grant, of Polk county, Saturday evening upon sighting from the Dallas-Salem stage. Sheriff Grant was notified by the sheriff of Marion county this morning to be on the lookout for a horse thief and immediately went to work on the case. A man bearing out the description of the party wanted had arrived in town Friday night riding a bay horse, which he left in a feed stable. The horse was recognized by Sheriff Grant as an animal belonging to Ira Remington, a farmer living four miles south of Dallas. Getting in communication with Remington over the phone, he found the horse had been traded to a stranger Friday afternoon for the stranger's roan animal, the unknown man receiving \$50 in cash on the transaction. The sheriff found that a man answering the description of the party wanted, had cashed a check at the saloon of D. A. Madison, late Friday night, signed by Remington for \$50. He also discovered that the man had stayed at a boarding house that night, leaving early Saturday morning, supposedly for Portland. Officers at Portland were immediately notified to be on the lookout. While awaiting news from Portland the sheriff was astounded to see his man climb from the Salem stage. The fellow was immediately placed under arrest. He was identified by both Remington and Madison and was placed in the county jail to await the arrival of the Marion county sheriff. Remington has stopped payment on the check and there will probably be more trouble on that score. Johnson strenuously denies his guilt. He was taken back to Salem to stand trial.

Fire at Independence.

Fire broke out at 1 o'clock Friday night in a large lumber shed near the depot at Independence. The fire department turned out promptly, but the flames had gained such headway that it

was impossible to save any part of the structure or the contents which was mostly baled hay. The fire is supposed to have been of incendiary origin. Hobbes were routed out of the building earlier in the night, and it is thought that they returned and set fire to the structure. The loss is estimated at about \$100.

CUTS FREIGHT RATE.

West Side Tariff Reduced by Southern Pacific.

Lower freight rates that will considerably benefit manufacturing industries in South Portland and along the West Side and Yamhill divisions of the Southern Pacific have just been announced by the traffic department of the Harriman lines. The new rates will become effective April 25 and will apply to all points on the Southern Pacific south of Albany.

The new schedule will give to all shippers on the two divisions named a tariff to the southern part of the state just 25 cents a ton in excess of the rates charged from the Park street of Main freight depot. This rate will apply on all commodities shipped in carload lots.

Heretofore the South Portland industries and those along the West Side and Yamhill divisions have been compelled to overcome a tariff handicap in selling to the Southern Oregon market. It was necessary for them to pay the distance tariffs, which form the maximum schedule from the place of shipment to destination. These tariffs run considerably higher than the local tariffs from the main freight depot in Portland which must now be paid with an additional 25 cents a ton.

Lumber is the chief commodity shipped from the territory effected by this reduction into Southern Oregon. Industries in South Portland have long been working for transportation facilities that will place them on equal footing for shipments with factories in other sections of the city and the schedule just announced is regarded as a step toward this goal.
