The season in the Willamette Valley area that some farmers does not get his crop in during February he can put it in the month following. I have known wheat to be sown in every month of the year, and when it is put in a fair crop is harvested. I have known wheat to be sown the last days of June, and during the fall it enters the soil and left to grow and make a crop, harvested in July thirteen months after it was sown and a good yield secured. One year I sowed wheat the 20th of January and cut it July 20th and it gave me fifty bushels to the acre.—Dexter Field in Hoquiam.
