His clerical ability is unquestioned, his honor and integrity of the highest standard, and he will do his duty both by the people and the county. No third term he will ever enter his honor, but when he has filled the office for the period of a year, he will be ready to step down and out and hand over the office to his successor.

As a rule we fail to appreciate fully the daily importance of electricity in this busy world because the subtle current has become so universal and common as to pass almost unnoticed. And like all things of common good, it is missed only when it is gone. People use the telephone, the telegraph, ride on the street cars and turn on the electric lights without a thought of the hourly importance of electricity to their comfort and convenience. That there is a move-out in the state of Oregon even, to hold up a small portion for armories for the proper training of hundreds of national gardeners by the state, it is news which Captain Hobson received with surprise. He said there was no investment which the people could possibly make that would give so large a return in due time. Trained citizen soldiers constitute our great hope, he said, since the policy of the country is to keep a mere handful of a regular army. "I hope the people of Oregon will not be so short sighted or so neglectful of their duty to the nation as to vote down a measure of that kind at their June election," added Captain Hobson.

In Wayne D. Henry the people of Polk county have the only purely county candidate for a state legislature who has unreservedly announced himself as bound to serve the people in their choice for senator. He announced even prior to the primaries his firm allegiance to the principle involved in Statement No. 1. If the people of Polk county really desire to stop the holdups, turmoil and graft engendered by the election of a U. S. senator by the legislature, he is that the sun will rise tomorrow. He is confronted by an immense republican majority, but this will not so figure if Polk county people vote as they talk—if they really are sincere in what they boldly assert. Mr. Henry stands for a principle not a party; a principle that will give Oregon the initiative in striking off the chains forever that have so long bound us in the matter and made the election of persons to our highest law making body a farce to ourselves and us a ridicule to the civilized world. If we are to take this grand step in political reform, let us make it with no uncertainty. Let us give every candidate who says he will abide by the people's choice such an overwhelming majority that there will be no doubt of our desires in the matter. There need be no hesitancy, no sticking to party lines. We are well aware of the evils we desire to correct. All we have to do is to cast our ballots and cast them right.

### CONCLUSIVE EVIDENCE

That Harry Bennett Was Blown Up By Dynamite

Coroner R. L. Chapman informs us that conclusive evidence was found the other day of the blowing up by dynamite of Harry Bennett on Goose-neck during November, 1906. When a muffled trunk was found in the mill pond there two or three weeks ago, it was finally believed by the coroner's jury that the remains were those of Bennett, but there was nothing to indisputably prove them so. Four miles still farther up the creek this week some one found a shoe with two socks therein and the bones of a leg and foot. The shoe was one generally worn by loggers and was the one worn by Bennett when he was blown up. The inner sock, a common one, is where the conclusive proof of identification comes in. Mrs. Bennett has positively identified it as one knit by herself for her son, and says there was probably not such another pair in Oregon. It was made from mohair and gave extra protection from cold. So ends the last chapter in the tragic death of young Bennett. Engaged in blasting rock seven miles up the creek from the mill where he was employed, he and his comrade are blown up. The other man's body was found comparatively near the scene of explosion. Unmistakable search is made for Bennett's body, but large searching parties, going over as it seemed every inch of ground, failed to locate it. Nearly 17 months after the trunk was found seven miles from the scene of the disaster, and now one foot over three miles away, showing that the explosion must have been a most terrific one.
