DIXIE MILL SOLD.

Peter Cook and Will Rowell Now Proprietors.

The Dallas City bank has this day transferred to Peter Cook, Wm. Rowell, their heirs and assigns all their interest into what is known as the Dixie flouring mill. It is the intention of Messrs. Cook & Rowell to by the end of the harvest season install suitable machinery for the proper grinding of flour for the local trade. They meanwhile will do a warehouse business and cleaning work. Mr. Rowell will be miller and manager, and his long experience in this capacity guarantees to the public the best of service and a high grade of flour.

BUY ROCK CRUSHER.

The County Court Invest in Roller And Crusher.

The county court setting in extra session this morning concluded a deal with Beale & Co., of Portland, by which they became the possessors of an Aurora rock crusher, with 24-foot elevator, shoot screens, mounted on trucks, f. o. b. Dallas at a cost of \$11,400 when it has been accepted by the court and found to be doing the work in good shape. They also purchased an American road motor roller on the same terms for \$2960. If everything is in readiness this will be first worked on the Salt Creek road, and it is the plan of the court to have rock delivered at the road by parties interested when the county will crush and spread it. More extended mention is prohibited by our going to press. It will arrive about July 1st.

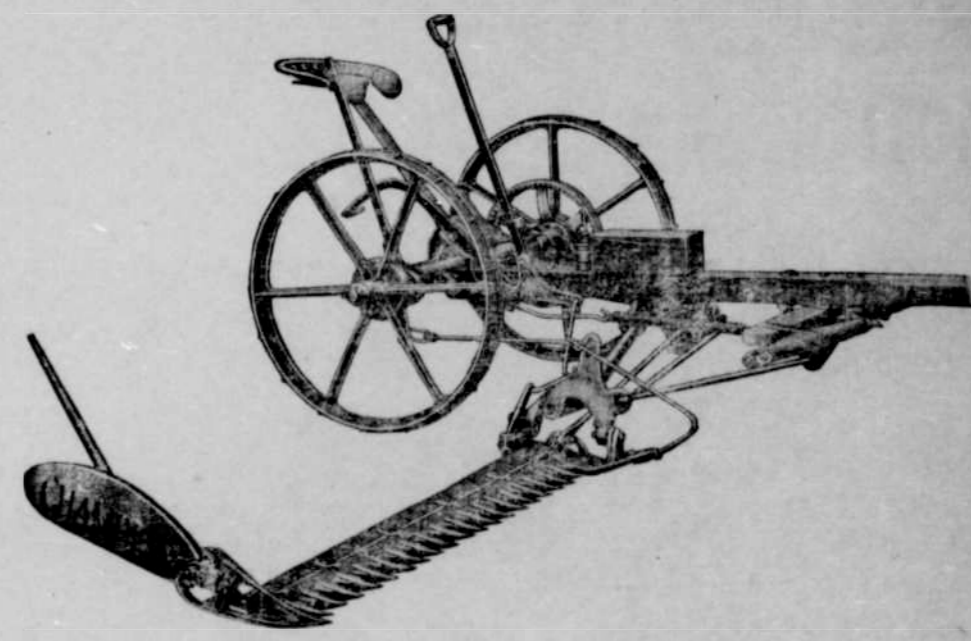
