A DALLAS INVENTOR.
Mr. Henry Ruddick Secures Separator Patent.
Mr. Henry Ruddick, miller at the Dallas flouring mills, has just received notice that a patent has been granted him at Washington, D. C. for a wheat separator. Mr. Ruddick's inventive genius is of a high order as will be seen by the attached description of his separator and his invention is likely to prove highly remunerative, as it is of practical utility and of great value to those in that line of work.
In a separator of the class described, the combination with a frame, a vertically disposed hopper on a self frame having an inclined lower end and an opening at the top, a series of rollers, one end wall and a chute extending above and below said opening; of a series of screens below said chute, flexible straps at one end of said frame, means to adjust one end of the frames on the supporting struts, screens in said frame, a driving shaft for said frames, means for operating the same, whereby said screen frames will be oscillated in opposition to each other and means to convey the product from one to the next succeeding screen.
