POLK GETS RANGE.

Wins Out for Military Rifle Tournament.
 Through the untiring efforts of Captain Charles A. Murphy, of Company M, Oregon National Guard, Salem has finally been chosen as the place for the state military rifle tournament to be held somewhere in the middle of July. A Major-General F. Finest, representing the governor, accompanied by Major Baker, of the headquarters staff, of Portland, were in the city yesterday and in company with Captain Murphy and Lieutenant Carl Abrams, visited the range across the river for the purpose of estimating the amount of additional necessary equipment and making a final decision as to the fitness of the grounds. Mr. Minnieville, Portland and Roseburg have been putting forth their best efforts to secure the state "shoot" as it means the attendance of about 200 of Oregon's crack marksmen. However, there was no getting around the fact that the range across the river was by far the best adapted for target shooting at all distances.
 The tournament will last for one week and owing to the large number of participants the range will be placed in suitable condition at the earliest possible date. New steel target racks, such as are used on the national range, which will be installed. Substantial telephone lines will be constructed from the pits to the firing lines, a good camping site will be arranged and plenty of good water provided for the teams composed of five men to the team, the best marksmen of the Oregon National Guard, from nineteen companies, will participate in the shoot.
 Beside the number of valuable prizes and trophies which are annually contested in this contest, the Oregon National Guard at heart, will offer several beautiful loving-cups, both of team work and best individual scores.
 A model of the rifle range in streets, will be established and in the evenings, after the day of nerve-trying marksmanship, the militiamen will enjoy the excellent swimming and boating facilities which will be provided on the banks of the Willamette.—Statesman.

THAT 100 YARD RACE.
