KILLED IN POLK.

Head Run Over and Horribly Crushed.

The remains of John W. Brannon, who was killed on the M. P. Dennis' farm in Polk county, Monday by being run over by a wagon, were interred Thursday afternoon in the City View cemetery.

Brannon was in the employ of M. P. Dennis of this city and had been hauling wood with one of Mr. Dennis' teams. The accident occurred when Brannon tried to descend a steep hill with a big load of wood and the horse slipped off the shock throwing him to the ground and under the wheels. He fell under the path of the wagon with the exception of his head which was directly in line with the wheel and which was crushed to a pulp by the wagon and the heavy load.

The wagon crossed onto the team and undoubtedly would have killed both animals had it not been for the fact that one wheel struck a tree and stopped the wagon instantly. The horses had gained so much momentum, however, that when the wagon was stopped the force of the collision was great enough to break all four tugs and smash other parts of the harness. Once freed from the heavy load the team ambled down the hillside about a few minutes later when they were found munched grass.

When the team broke loose from the wagon they were seen by Mrs. Brannon and by a man who has been employed by Mr. Dennis, both of whom ran to the spot where the accident occurred. The stricken wife became almost insane with grief when she found her husband dead.

Brannon came here three months ago from Minnesota, bringing his wife and four children with him. They had but little money but the head of the family found employment with Mr. Dennis and has been sending back all the money he could spare to pay for eating and preparing his goods for shipment. They are now on the way and are expected to arrive in a few days.

Mr. Dennis has interested himself in the welfare of the stricken woman and children, so anxiously bereft of their support, and will seek to aid them in a financial way.

The oldest child, a girl, is only thirteen and the youngest three months.

The family has been living in a tent on the Dennis' farm, about three miles from the city.

The dead man left no property and no life insurance.

He was about 48 years old.—Salem Statesman.
