COMPANY H REPORTS.

Interesting Account of What the Boys are Doing.

Headquarters Co. H, 4th Infantry, U. S. G., Camp David S. Stanley, August 4, 1904.

As company H arrived in «Murray» yesterday at 6 p. m. after a very enjoyable train ride, and are now comfortably encamped in the quarters set aside for them. The boys had their first drill today and came out with shining colors, and much praise from the commanding officers on their excellent showing.

This forenoon was given over to battalion drill, the afternoon to front and rear guard drills. All the battalion and skirmish work is new to the boys, but they caught on in good shape. Orders for tomorrow will not be given out until tomorrow morning.

There are about 5,000 men in camp here at present, composed of the two Oregon regiments, one Washington regiment and two regiments of regular infantry. This is an excellent field for the maneuvering that will take place this week. Troops can be marched and mobilized in either direction from the camp for a distance of 20 miles through a country covered with patches of valley and sparse oaks and fir through timbered hills.

An excellent imaginary enemy, on August 10th the great sham battle between the browns and blues will take place, in which all troops in camp will participate.

The boys have a great joke on Captain Corpening and Lieutenant Bolman. At Chelalis en-route, the train stopped for a few minutes and the two officers had taken advantage of the fact to run over to a nearby dispensary and procure a soda.
