THE CITY COUNCIL

Allow Moving Picture Shows Open on Sunday Afternoons.

The city council met in regular session last Monday night, but owing to a quorum not being present adjourned their sitting until last night, when all the officials except M. M. Ellis could be present, and necessary business transacted. After the routine work of reading the minutes, etc., Councilman Uglow, chairman of the fire and water committee, reported that the back lots of our business blocks were in a filthy and dangerous condition from filth to five, and the marshal was instructed to order the interested parties to clean up at once or stand the penalty attached to such violation of the ordinance as laid down and provided for by the city's government. This order was extended to cover the entire city, where filth and debris may be encountered, and the marshal carefully instructed to thoroughly look into the matter.

The claim of I. V. Lynch & Son for \$35.75 was referred to the finance committee for segregation of items and allotting to the different funds, as the council would request that all who have dealings with the city put in their bills monthly and not present them running over a long period. While the street work is in progress, it is necessary that items relating to such work be kept apart from that of the general fund, and it is not small task to keep track of such. The handling in of bills monthly will greatly facilitate both.

The moving picture ordinance next came up for second reading, and was passed. It provides that the license for one day shall be \$2, for one week \$8, for one quarter \$15, and for one year \$40. Quite a discussion was on as to allowing them to run Sundays, and it was finally decided that they may be open on such days from 2 until 5 in the afternoon. It is the general practice of other towns to allow of their doing so, but our council were not in favor of any night sessions. Mayor Muir has ten days in which to file with the auditor his veto of a measure or he can let it become a law by not affixing his signature, thereby showing his non-concurrence. While the ordinance was on last night we learned that he will probably not veto this measure, as the allowing of them to run only in the afternoon does not conflict with any regulations that may be held.

Bids were ordered called for regarding certain sidewalks not yet erected by the parties concerned.

Treasurer Vassall made his report regarding the street fund, as given elsewhere, and made certain recommendations.

Councilman Cooper moved that \$2,500 be transferred from the street fund to the general fund to continue the street work. Carried.

It was also ordered that D. J. Roney be paid \$10 interest on the two water extension bonds of \$100 each that he holds and that one of them be taken up. It was further ordered that the balance on saloon licenses be paid back to the auditor and the balance for their going out of business.

The matter of licensing the sale of near beer came up for discussion and the city attorney was ordered to draw up an ordinance putting a license on all drinks which contain any percentage of malt. It is necessary that the sellers of this beverage be licensed. License of \$20 a year, and the council thought it but right that the city should also derive some revenue from its sale. This will cover the other drinks as well wherever sold—in fact any drink in which malt is one of the ingredients.

The auditor was instructed, on motion of Councilman Cooper, to look into the matter of getting rid of the surplus water accumulating on Washington street each winter and find out some way of getting rid of it.

On motion of Myers the council adjourned to meet again September 2nd.
