INDEPENDENCE.

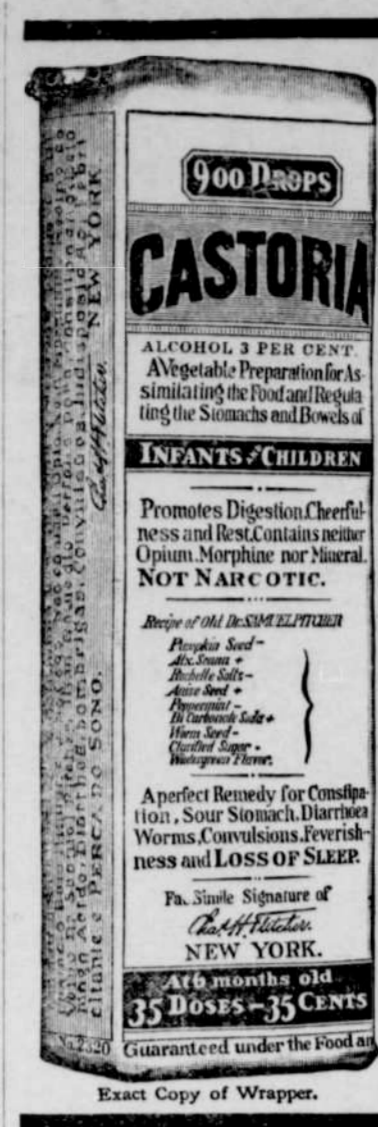
Sam and Willie Morrison's father died last Tuesday and was buried in the Smith cemetery Wednesday. He was 84 years of age.
