FINGERS TORN OUT.
Little Jacob Buhler Meets with Sad Accident.

Yesterday Jacob, the little 12-year old of Mr. Abe Buhler, met with a most regrettable accident while handling an unruly horse. The horse was in the habit of pulling back and the boy imagined that by wrapping the rope around his fingers he would be able to hold him when so doing. The result was that his fingers were nearly jerked from their sockets and most cruelly lacerated. He was brought to town last evening and Dr. McCallon found it necessary to amputate three of them, the little fellow exhibiting most amazing fortitude while the operation was being performed. He already had a reputation in this respect, as some months ago when suffering a broken limb he had it attended to without an anesthetic and without in any way showing the agony suffered during the ordinary of setting.

More Cement Walks.
About 14 men are now at work on Main street, between Mill and Oak in hauling off gravel, building a cement arch over the race and cement walks for R. E. Williams and Kerslake & White. Mr. Williams' walk is quite expensive, entailing as it does a concrete foundation for the race, sidewalks and arch before commencing on the walk proper, besides considerable of a fill on the side. In the construction of this cement walk he will at one be joined by Dr. McCallon, making 110 feet of new cement walk to go down on that side of the sidewalks. As to whether Mr. D. C. Crider will continue on to the corner we are not informed. The laying of the cement arch over the race is a project which has many interested spectators. Architect Morrison has had made a curved pattern of wood, over which the cement is spread on the sidewalks. This wooden pattern has a space of some six inches left in the middle over which the arch is to be poured and receive the cement. When one section has thoroughly dried, which takes about 24 hours, the arch is unlocked and shoveled out. The arch is to be laid in sections so that it can be readily withdrawn. So the arch is built section by section until finished. This is the eighth block of street improvement to be completed. The remaining one on Washington street will probably not be completed until after the contemplated sewer on that street is laid. This may throw it until next spring.

A MISSION FOR DALLAS

Two Jesuit missionaries from California will arrive in Dallas tomorrow, and on Sunday morning, in Woodman hall, at 10:30 o'clock they will open a mission to which Catholics and non-Catholics are cordially invited. They are Father Charles J. O'Reilly, two learned and eloquent priests, who have specially prepared themselves to give missions. They are Father O'Reilly, assistant Rev. H. J. McDevitt, of Portland, to Dallas to make the necessary arrangements for their coming. The opening of the mission will be at 10:30 o'clock Sunday morning. The evening services during the entire week will begin at 7:30 o'clock, and the mission will be at 8:30 a. m., followed by an instruction. The mission will close on Sunday evening, September 6th. During this mission no Catholic will have a good chance to learn from an authentic source just what Catholics believe and what they do not believe. The Catholic church has a membership in the world of over 250,000,000 souls, about 12,000,000 of whom are in the United States. So that an organization is being formed to reach our country. What is her true history? What are her doctrines that this church of the ages really teaches? These are questions that no one who claims to be well educated can afford to disregard. A Catholic church will soon be built in Dallas, so Archbishop Charles has determined, and he has sent Rev. H. J. McDevitt, of Portland, to arrange for its construction. Dallas needs a Catholic church for more reasons than one, not the least of which is that it will prove a powerful factor in the increase of our population, and add substantially to the volume of our prosperity.
